

Board Promotes From Within

After looking at all their options, The CSCD Board of Directors voted on November 16th to replace the vacant Conservancy Manager position with Brittany Bay and Nick Johann. Brittany was formerly the Financial Manager and Nick was solely the Building Compliance Officer. These new roles will split up the duties of the Conservancy Manager position. Brittany's new role will be Director of Finance and Administration. Nick will now be the Director of Operations and continue his role as the Building Compliance Officer.



Assessed Values on the Rise

Pat Sherman, CSCD Board, and Financial Advisory Committee member would like you to pay close attention to the upcoming property assessments. The assessed values within the conservancy district are increasing by nearly 100 million dollars. The county assessor will send out a letter notifying you of the assessment and your right to appeal. You will have 30 days to appeal their assessment. This has the potential to affect many if not all the property owners in the CSCD. This does not mean the district will receive more money but will affect how much tax you will pay.

Update on Dams

Planning and design has continued with Christopher Burke Engineering.

The Cordry Dam spillway repair is in the final stages of design and will be wrapped up in the first quarter of 2022.

The CSCD is pursuing a grant through the Indiana Department of Natural Resources for the Sweetwater Dam, We are able to apply for the grant since Sweetwater is labeled as a high hazard dam due to the properties, infrastructure, and economic loss that would result in a failure. The grant can be used for engineering services, analysis, or any repairs that may be identified.

The Cordry and Sweetwater Dam ratings are both conditionally poor. Due to unknowns, Sweetwater requires geotechnical engineering investigation (core samples) and a hydraulic analysis. Positive results from those will improve the rating. The Cordry Spillway will also need the same analysis completed but the rating will not improve until the spillway is repaired.

News From Your Ecology Commission

Exciting things are always happening at the Lakes, and many of them are related to the wonderful environment we find ourselves in here in the beautiful Cordry Sweetwater Conservancy District. As you know, the conservation, protection and enhancement of this great natural resource we call "CSCD" is the responsibility of the ECOLOGY Commission, in conjunction with your Board and the Conservancy Manager. Some of those conservation responsibilities are seen by some as controversial and often, the ECOLOGY Commission finds it necessary to weigh the principles of biology with the needs and desires of freeholders in order to strike a balance that protects our natural resources without any undue inconvenience (or danger) to freeholders. Such is the story of two important ongoing efforts of the ECOLOGY Commission that are of high visibility to all: The annual Deer Reduction Hunt and the upcoming Zebra Mussel Prevention Program.

The fourth annual CSCD **Deer Reduction Hunt** is currently underway. Hunting by designated and highly qualified and tested archery hunters began on approved properties on 18 October, 2021 and will continue until the end of January, 2022. Most hunting is done on weekdays, from 8 A.M. until 2 P.M., however during the period 1-20 November, legal Indiana hunting hours will be authorized (½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour after sunset) including on weekends. To date, the CSCD deer population has been reduced by over 120 deer since 2018 in these annual deer reduction hunts financed by grant monies from the Indiana DNR. And yet, the deer herd of CSCD is still considered to be over-populated by DNR standards.

Although the CSCD **Zebra Mussel Prevention** effort has been in full swing since February of 2021, the full impact of this invasive species prevention program will become much more evident in 2022 and 2023. The Zebra Mussel Study Committee formed in February 2021 and quickly transitioned to the Zebra Mussel Prevention Committee (ZMPC). We learned that, without proactive prevention measures put in place, CSCD lakes, like virtually every body of water north of Indianapolis including Geist Reservoir and Fall Creek, will become home to the dreaded and impossible-to-get-rid-of, zebra mussel, in huge numbers and with devastating effects. After 6 months of research, meetings, and study of states' zebra mussel experiences from Massachusetts to the east, Utah to the west, Wisconsin to the north and Texas to the south, the ZPMC put forth both a Freeholder Education Plan and a Zebra Mussel Prevention Action Plan. The Education Plan, already underway, culminates with a MANDATORY freeholder (online) "Zebra Mussel Boater-Aware Education Course," scheduled to be launched on the CSCD website in December, 2021. Successful completion of this online education course will be required for all boat-owning freeholders to purchase and receive any/all boat stickers from CSCD in the spring of 2022 (next spring). The online course, once launched, will take you approximately 40 minutes to complete and a perfect score of 100% is required on the 20 question test before you earn your "diploma" which you will need to purchase your boat stickers.

In addition, CSCD will be hiring a "boat steward" in April, who will oversee the overall Zebra Mussel Prevention Program for our lakes. He/she will, among other things, locate volunteer boat stewards to assist in the comprehensive prevention efforts. The plan calls for restrictive gates at both boat ramps; boat/motor/trailer inspections at the ramps before launch; a hot-water, high-pressure decontamination station located between the lakes for equipment that needs to be decontaminated, and a 24/7, expedient means to access and leave the lakes for properly decontaminated transient boats. Like any new plan and procedure, it will surely have wrinkles. We ask that everyone remain patient with all these new procedures until the Boat Steward and CSCD Staff work those wrinkles out.

Incidentally, if you'd be interested in serving as our CSCD "Boat Steward" for the 2022-2023 boating seasons, contact the CSCD office. The paid position will open in January 2022. Work as the boat steward will begin in April of each year and last until the end of October. Volunteer boat stewards will also be needed, as the one hired CSCD Boat Steward will need a team of volunteers to cover after-hours and weekend duties. More to follow on the CSCD website as the 2022 boating season approaches.

Recently, I spoke with Independent Land Surveying out of Columbus and they agreed to take on work in our area. Bennett and Associates also work in this area. Now is the time to give them a call to schedule a survey if your next years project will require one.

Water Department News

The Water Department has been busy making improvements to our water system to make it more efficient and to reduce operating cost. As part of our 2017 master infrastructure project, the original water transmission main from Princes Lake and booster pumping station were replaced. Also, as part of this project, the old mechanical customer water meters were replaced with high tech Sensus magnetic meters in 2018. These new meters are more accurate and have allowed the water department staff to eliminate physically reading each meter (which took 4 men, 5 days each month) by utilizing drive by technology to read the water meters (which then took 2 men, 1 day each month). These new meters also store continuous water use data that can be downloaded from the meter. During the summer of 2021, telemetering equipment was added to transmit me-

ter data to the CSCD office, thus eliminating the drive by reading process. All of the water meters can now be read in less than 10 minutes, which saves staff labor. This also allows the staff to monitor significant customer water usage and potential leaks within a 24 to 48 hour time period, which is a huge benefit to the water utility customers.

Water loss, due to system leaks and

fire protection use, is one of the most significant factors that effects the efficiency and operating costs of a water utility. Water loss in the typical water utility can range from a low of 25% to a high as much as 55%. Our water system is over 50 years old and water loss is more than we want. We are constantly working to identify leaks and repair or replace defective pipes. Finding leaks is like looking for a needle in a haystack. In an effort to more efficiently identify leaks, in October of 2021 we started our district metering project. This project consists of installing 13 water meters in strategic locations of our water system. By using these meters with data from customer meters we should be able to identify areas of significant water loss. We can then more effectively concentrate our water main replacement efforts to reduce water loss.

The CSCD Water Department is dedicated to providing safe, high-quality water and fire protection as cost effectively as possible.

Maintenance Department

The CSCD Maintenance Crew will be spending some time this winter working on the Nature Trails.

Freeholders can expect to see a new trail consisting of a few small groves of Evergreen trees, connecting the Cordry boat parking lot to Centerlake Park. Trail 4 will also be seeing some updates. There are plans to widen the Trail 4 loop to allow Freeholders, Maintenance Crews, and Emergency Personnel unrestricted access to that area of the trails. Trail 4 will also see a new short trail that will connect it to Sunset Drive near the beach. This will allow access from the beach, to and from Centerlake Park without having to walk the entire trail.

It's been a busy year for the Roads Commission! In addition to the regular maintenance items that the road crew address, the re- paving of Gopher, Grizzly, Groundhog, Lemur, Cougar, and Lynx Drives was completed in late summer. The paving of Buffalo Drive improving it from gravel to pavement was also completed.

For 2022 the paving of Bass Drive and Bass Ct, Heron Drive, Sweetwater Drive to Eagle Drive is on the budget. Birch Drive residents have approached the Roads Commission and have indicated they will help fund the paving of Birch Drive in 2022.

Tobi Ferguson has resigned from the commission due to relocation outside of the Conservancy District. Chad Crimmins has indicated that he will not be running for re-election from area #2 opening that seat open for applicants. Welcome Chip VanSysckle to the commission beginning in November 2021.

As fall approaches and the leaves fall, it is the responsibility of property owners to keep culverts and drainage tiles clear of leaves. As winter approaches, the 2 full time roads crew will be focusing on keeping our roads free of snow and ice.

Notice: A freeholder as prescribed by IC 14-33-2-3 is entitled to only one (1) vote per Freehold no matter how many names are on the deed for the freehold. If a freeholder or a group of freeholders own(s) more than one property in the CSCD, contact the CSCD office (317-933-2893) to determine if more than one vote may be cast for such properties.

You may vote for only one candidate in each area for the January 8, 2022, election for members of the CSCD Board of Directors.

Absentee ballots MUST be received by 4 pm on January 7, 2022 to be counted.

General Voting Instructions:

1. You may vote for only one candidate in each area for the election of board members of the CSCD Board of Directors. Only one name can be checked per area.

You may vote for one candidate from one or all areas. You do not have to vote only for the candidate of choice in the area in which your freehold is located.

Absentee Voting Instructions:

- 1. Note that completed absentee ballots must be received at the CSCD office by 4:00 PM on January 7, 2022. Ballots received after this time will not be counted.
- 2.An absentee ballot is included in this CSCD December newsletter and can be used to submit your vote along with the completed "Affidavit of Legal Freeholder." You may pick up an absentee voting package by visiting the CSCD office on any official business day observed by the CSCD office or you may call the CSCD office (317-933-2893) and request that an absentee voting package be mailed to you. It may also be obtained online at www.cscd-in.org.
- 3. Read and comply with the General Voting Instructions as stated above.
- 4.Complete and sign the "Affidavit of Legal Freeholder" form confirming that you are a freeholder in the Cordry Sweetwater Conservancy District. Have someone witness your signature on the form. One of the CSCD office staff can witness your form if you are voting at the office or turning your ballot in at the office.
- 5. Vote your ballot as you wish observing the instructions on the ballot. Place a mark on the line after the name of candidate for whom you wish to vote. You may vote for only one candidate in each area. You may vote for a candidate in one area or one candidate in each area if you wish. Write nothing else on your ballot that would in any way identify who is casting this ballot since this must be a secret ballot by state law
- **6.**Fold and place your completed ballot in a plain white envelop. Make sure that the envelop is marked "BALLOT". No other information should be written on the ballot envelop since this is a secret ballot by state law.
- 7.Do not place the completed "Affidavit of Legal Freeholder" form in the "BALLOT" envelop described above. Only the ballot is to be placed in the "BALLOT" envelop.
- 8. If mailing the absentee ballot to the CSCD office use the following instructions. Place the completed "Affidavit of Legal Freeholder" form and the plain envelop marked "BALLOT" in another envelop addressed to: CSCD, ATTN: Election Committee, 8377 Cordry Drive, Nineveh, IN 46164. Make sure to mail in enough time to reach the CSCD office by January 7, 2022.
